Seasonal Creativity and Environmental Discovery

Pupils have been embracing the autumn season with a mix of creativity, exploration, and hands-on learning. As part of our seasonal activities, pupils visited Snugburys, where they took part in the spooky trail, enjoyed an ice cream, and selected their own pumpkin to bring back to school. Back in class, they demonstrated impressive creativity and focus as they designed and carved their pumpkins, (above) producing some truly outstanding results!

In their John Muir Award sessions, pupils have been exploring the natural world through the lens of a documentary maker. Drawing inspiration from the wildlife around them, they have been creating their own Minibeast documentaries — investigating local habitats, observing and recording species, and collecting photographs and field notes. Back in school, they have collaborated to write scripts, record narrations, and edit their footage into informative short films.

Art & Craft

This term, pupils have explored two contrasting yet equally creative art forms — calligraphy and graffiti. Through graffiti, they investigated how bold colour, scale, and lettering can express identity and emotion in public spaces. In contrast, calligraphy encouraged precision and control, using specialist brushes to create elegant, flowing letterforms.

Both projects invited pupils to consider how art and writing combine to communicate ideas — from the expressive energy of street art to the refined beauty of hand lettering






Science

At KS3, pupils have been exploring the building blocks of life — cells. They've learned to use microscopes, identify cell structures, and understand how specialised cells work together in tissues and organs. This foundation helps them appreciate how the body functions as a coordinated system.

At KS4, the focus shifts to immunity and infection. Pupils investigate how pathogens cause disease, how the immune system protects us, and how vaccines and antibiotics work. Through experiments and case studies, they're developing a deeper understanding of health, disease prevention, and the importance of scientific research in medicine.



Maths

This month in Maths, our pupils have been deepening their understanding of place value, addition, and subtraction. We've been exploring how each digit has its own value and how this helps us read, write, and compare large numbers with confidence. Pupils have practised adding and subtracting whole numbers and decimals, using number lines, place value grids, and practical resources to support their learning.

To celebrate Halloween, we've been playing Halloween Times Tables Games—a spooky and fun way to boost multiplication skills through challenges and team competitions.

During a recent learning walk, our headteacher loved seeing adaptive learning in action. Tom, our Maths teacher, was teaching multiplication in three different ways, so each pupil could learn using their preferred method.

Our learners showed brilliant focus, teamwork, and enthusiasm—proving that when learning fits the individual, everyone can shine!

Online Safety

Embedded in our Drama and Communication form lessons, we have been delivering important CEOP (online Safety) lessons to help pupils stay safe online by understanding how to recognise, respond to, and report online risks. English


In English lessons, our pupils have been developing a range of important reading and writing skills. Across Key Stage 3, they've been strengthening comprehension, vocabulary, inference, and deduction—key skills for confident, independent readers.

Lessons have been tailored to suit each group's interests and needs. The lower KS3 group moved from studying Sherlock Holmes to The Book That No One Wanted to Read, a text that sparked their curiosity and boosted engagement. Towards the end of the term, they were introduced to The Hodgeheg after showing a real love of animals.

Meanwhile, the upper KS3 group have continued to explore the mysteries of Sherlock Holmes, enjoying the challenge of analysing clues, characters, and classic detective storytelling.

This personalised approach has led to fantastic engagement across all groups, with pupils developing not only their reading skills but also a genuine love of books and stories.

Employability

Mentorship

This year, we've introduced the Mentorship Award as part of our KS4 offer—an exciting opportunity for pupils to demonstrate and be recognised for their teamwork, leadership, and communication skills.

Our KS4 pupils, have made an impressive start by supporting younger learners and showing what it means to be a positive role model.

This initiative is already making an excellent contribution to the development of key workplace and social skills—helping our pupils grow into confident, capable young adults

History

This term in History, pupils have studied the Magna Carta (1215) — a landmark agreement that limited royal power and protected people's rights. Through discussion, role play, and creative activities, they explored why it was written and how its ideas of freedom, fairness, and justice continue to shape democracy and law today.

ICT

In KS3 pupils have used spreadsheets to investigate social media usage. They collected and analysed data, applied formulas, and created charts to identify trends. The project has strengthened their digital literacy and critical thinking, encouraging reflection on screen time, online habits, and the wider impact of social media.

At Key Stage 4, pupils have begun working towards their Level 1/2 IT User Skills qualification. As part of their coursework, they are creating a multimedia, interactive presentation for a museum on the history of gaming. This project develops a range of key skills, including understanding audience and purpose, graphic design, navigation, AI integration, and maintaining a consistent house style







Magnavox Odyssey: The First Home Video Game Console

The Magnavox Odyssey, released in 1972, was the world's first home video game console. Created by Ralph H. Baer, it featured simple black-and-white graphics, used game cards, and screen overlays. It had no sound or scoring. Though primitive, it laid the foundation for the video game industry and future consoles.
